5. **ITEMS OF BUSINESS**

Resolution No. 2009/10-F-01, Authority to Submit 5.1 an Application for the Qualified School Construction Bond Program (Roll Call Vote)

The Board of Trustees is requested to adopt Resolution No. 2009/10-F-01, Authority to Submit an Application for the Qualified School Construction Bond Program. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009 authorized the issuance of Qualified School Construction Bonds (QSCB) as a means of promoting investment in school facilities during the current recession. The United States Treasury Department will set a tax-credit rate for investors holding QSCBs that, on average, equals the amount of interest schools would ordinarily pay on debt. With the federal government covering most or all of the interest on the bonds, school districts will have up to 30 percent more available funds for construction. A total of \$773,525,000 has been allocated to the California Department of Education (CDE) to award to California school districts in amounts not to exceed \$25,000,000, per district for calendar year 2009. Applications from school districts are due by August 25, 2009. It is expected that this program will be over-subscribed by districts in which case the CDE will

conduct a lottery to select applications for approval. Once the CDE approves an application, the school district must issue bonds by December 31, 2009, or the authorization automatically will revert back to the CDE. The terms of the program require that within six months of issuance, the district must have entered into contracts equaling at least 10 percent of the bond proceeds. Within three years of the date of issuance, 100 percent of the bond proceeds must be spent. Staff requests approval of the resolution to submit an application for \$25,000,000, from the 2009 cycle of the Qualified School Construction Bond Program to the California Department of Education. **[EXHIBIT A]**

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ANAHEIM UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT

RESOLUTION REQUESTING AUTHORITY TO ISSUE QUALIFIED SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION BOND

RESOLUTION NO. 2009/10-F-01

August 20, 2009

WHEREAS, through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), the United States Congress authorized the issuance of Qualified School Construction Bonds (QSCB), where qualifying school districts could issue interest free bonds to be used for the construction, rehabilitation, or repair of a public school facility, or for the acquisition of land on which such a facility is to be constructed; and

WHEREAS, the California Department of Education is responsible for allocating the authority to issue Qualified School Construction Bonds among eligible schools in the State of California applying for such authority; and

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that ten (10) percent of the proceeds of the Qualified School Construction Bond will be used for:

- Construction of public school facilities;
- Rehabilitation or repair of school facilities;
- Acquisition of land on which public school facilities will be constructed with proceeds of issuance; or
- Equipment related to the project(s) construction or rehabilitated with the proceeds of issuance.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that within six months of issuance, a contract or contracts will be entered into for use of proceeds equal to ten percent of the issuance.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that within three years of issuance, 100 percent of the bond proceeds will be spent for a qualified purpose.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors or subcontractors on projects funded by Qualified School Construction Bond proceeds shall be paid wages and fringe benefits at rates not less than those prevailing on similar projects in the locality.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that all applicable state and local law requirements governing conflicts of interest are satisfied with respect to this issue, and if additional conflict of interest rules are imposed by Internal Revenue Service regulation, such additional rules will be satisfied with respect to the issue. **WHEREAS,** the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that within fifteen days of bond issuance, a copy of Internal Revenue Form 8038, Information Return for Tax-Exempted Private Activity Bonds will be submitted to the California Department of Education.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees certifies that at the conclusion of the project(s), a completion report will be submitted to the California Department of Education.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees declares that any and all unused portions of the authorization that has not been issued by December 31, 2009, shall revert to the state, to be allocated or reallocated as determined by the California Department of Education in its sole discretion.

WHEREAS, the Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees will comply with the provisions of *Education Code* sections and 17150-17150.1 and 42133, if non-voter approved debt is to be issued.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Anaheim Union High School District Board of Trustees authorizes an application to be submitted to the California Department of Education requesting an authorization from the Qualified School Construction Bond Program.


